

Tree Care

#### Tree Removal is Serious Business By Luis Casas, Legacy Tree Care

aving your trees removed is not as simple a task as one might think. Before removing trees, it is important to know whether it is your best option. There are several factors that go into deter-

mining whether tree removal is necessary or if the tree can be saved. Furthermore, Los Angeles is filled with protected trees that, if removing, require certain standards be met and permits acquired.

#### Is removing the tree your best option?

Trees are very robust organisms that usually require multiple stresses to bring them down. Sometimes it is hard to know when removing the tree is your best option. To help make that determination, consider these things:

- Is more than 50 percent of the tree dead or damaged where leaving it may create a safety risk for people or property?
- Is the tree trunk or large branches compromised, showing cracks, splits, dead branches, and internal decay?
- Is the tree too close to a structure and posing a hazard?
- Is your tree not growing well? Does it have an extreme lean with poor or abnormal trunk taper.
- Does the tree have fungal bodies growing along the main trunk? Is the tree hollow or rotting in more than 30% of the main trunk?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, your best option might be to remove the tree. Before you do...it's best to get a professional consultation. Have an arborist see if they can save your trees and save you some costly removal expenses. They should also be able to tell you if it's a protected tree. If the tree is protected, there are specific steps that need to be taken.

#### Who can remove your protected tree?

Did you know that La Canada Flintridge – and many more cities all over California – has implemented standards regarding who can remove protected trees? These standards require that a tree removal permit be acquired, and that the contractor:

• have a D49 Tree Service License,



- be an arborist or commercial tree service on the Official City Approved List,
- and have a city business license.

Furthermore, before the tree is removed, as a condition to granting a tree removal permit, the property owner or applicant is required to plant replacement trees on the subject property or pay a designated amount into the city's tree replacement fund. Rules vary by city so be sure to visit your city's official website to learn theirs.

## How do you get a permit to remove a protected tree?

If you are looking to remove a protected tree, even when planted on private property, a removal permit is required. Before applying for a permit, you need to contact the bureau's

service request section at (800) 996-CITY (2489) or dial 3-1-1 to obtain an eight-digit Service Request (SR) number. Be prepared to give them the property owner's name, agent's name (if applicable), address of the tree(s) location, mailing address with zip code, and a daytime phone number. Once you have the SR number, you will need to complete a Protected Tree Removal Permit Application. Contact the division at (213) 847-3077 to request an application be mailed or emailed to you. Your SR number must be included on the application for the bureau to process your request.

#### Top 10 Culture Tips By Jonathan Goldhill, the Goldhill Group

**1.** There is always room for improvement. Building a culture in the workplace is like building a city. There are always places to grow and expand for the betterment of the people.

**2.** You don't just suddenly have a culture, especially not a good one. You must build it. Start with your purpose, values, and vision. This is your cultural foundation. Without a foundation, you have nothing to build upon.

**3.** To build your ideal culture, you need employees that fit your ideal culture. Hire people who fit your core values. When people don't share your values, their presence can destroy a culture over time. Values are like behaviors we operate by; when people operate differently, they destroy the integrity of the organization.

**4.** Include company culture training as part of the onboarding experience. It's important to start out on the right foot. Make sure your cultural values are aligned with the workplace behavior from Day 1. Don't have aspirational values you don't live. Work with the revealed values already present,

**5.** Culture trickles down not up. If the upper leadership is not exemplifying the ideal culture, the team never will. Leaders should walk their walk and talk their talk. Authentic leaders embrace and live the values.



**6.** Focus on principles, not practices. In these times no organization is exempt from the frequent and sometimes drastic changes that plague the economy, especially in regards to technology. Practices are likely to become obsolete after half a decade while principles hold true.

**7.** Pick the right perks to build upon your cultural foundation. If the mission, values, and vision are the foundation, perks help build the structure. From medical benefits to vacation time to in office entertainment options, perks should be chosen to reflect your core principles and emphasize the culture. If your business is a family business and values family values, an employee might expect above average benefits in regarding maternity/paternity leave and vacation time as well as flexible work hours in order to maximize family time while still getting the job done.

**8.** Growth requires feedback. Road bumps and missteps cannot be fixed if they aren't known about. To foster a better company culture, leaders need relevant and timely feedback from their employees, and employees need relevant and timely feedback from their leaders. We recommend you have Start-Stop-Continue conversations with your people frequently.

**9.** Growth requires goals and metrics. What does it mean to you to have reached your next cultural milestone? 88% employee satisfaction? 99%? Set your goal, gather feedback on how to get there, implement changes, and gather feedback to see if you made it. Without monitoring key cultural metrics, you won't be able to analyze your progress, potentially stunting growth, and masking issues.

**10. Remember the team building activities.** To build and sustain a healthy team culture, the team needs to know each other. Find team building activities that create a cohesive work unit. *You can reach the Goldhill Group – Coaching for Growing*

#### Support Builds for a 2022 Water Infrastructure Funding Initiative

A Letter Submitted by John Vorbeck, CLCA Life Member

This is an urgent message about water, or lack of it, from John Vorbeck, Life Member of CLCA. As you may have heard by now Governor Newsom has cut off all farmers in the State of California from getting water from the state and federal water projects. This is going to affect the cost and availability of the vegetables and the fruit you buy at the supermarket because they will soon need to be imported from other states or other countries. But there is a way to prevent this from happening.

Besides being a proud member of CLCA, I am also a member of California Water for Food and People Movement

petition to place the Water Infrastructure Funding Act of 2022 on the November 2022 ballot.

(Californiawaterforfoodandpeople. com.) The movement is going to help place an initiative on the November 2022 ballot for voters to approve. The initiative is the Water Infrastructure Funding Act of 2022. The petition to get the initiative on the ballot is called More Water Now, and the website is Morewaternow. com.

To qualify and pass this initiative will take a powerful coalition of grassroots activists, water agencies, engineering contractors, agribusiness, Green Industry professionals, and labor.

Our ballot proposition, a nonpar-

tisan initiative constitutional amendment, when approved by voters, will accomplish the following objectives:

First, to allocate two percent of the state's general fund for construction projects - aquifer storage, wastewater recycling, conveyances, surface storage, desalination, and water


treatment - to increase the annual sustainable supply of water to California's cities and farms by five-million-acre feet. The measure authorizes up to 50 percent of this revenue to be used to make payments on construction bonds, which immediately could raise about \$40 billion.

Second, this initiative aims to alleviate the legal and bureaucratic obstacles to getting water projects approved and funded. We want this money to pay workers to build things, not to pay for endless litigation and bureaucracy. We believe the language we've arrived at strikes a delicate balance. It leaves protections in place for the environment but streamlines

the process.

Several years ago, the state's voters approved a bond issue of 50 billion dollars to build two new dams that will

provide another 500-million-acre feet of water per year, but the legislature never followed through. Instead, they spent some of the money on things other than those pertinent to water. The difference here, is that this initiative is not a bond issue. It will set aside 2% of the state's budget for water related programs.

California is the wealthiest, most innovative place in the world. If there is anywhere on Earth where the challenges of drought and climate change can be overcome, it is here. Let's solve these challenges, and instead of water rationing, create water abundance.

Please visit morewaternow.com and sign up to help gather petition signatures to ensure the initiative qualifies for the November 2022 ballot. Donations are also accepted. To mail a check to the More Water Now campaign, make your check payable to "More Water Now," P.O. Box 730, Hilmar, CA 95324. State election law requires political committees to report the name, physical address, occupation, and name of employer of individuals whose contributions



exceed \$100 in a calendar year. Please include this information with your donation. If you wish, you can download and print a donation form from More Water Now website
